
Marion Kerby, who was a founding member of the Society. Marge's leadership and vision will be missed!

## Fundraiser to Benefit the Permanent Festival Stage

A fundraising dinner and auction for the permanent stage is scheduled for May on a date yet to be announced. **2008 Goals:** Dismantle and move the historic Finnish barn donated by **Helen Sackerman**, and start building the stage portion of the project at the new festival location This new spot will be used for this year's festival.

Then begins the process of reassembling the barn starting with the log framework. We estimate the barn and stage project will take 5-7 years to complete. The McCall Folklore Society and the Long Valley Preservation Society are working together to make this dream a reality. The permanent stage built against the backdrop of an historic Finnish barn will make our venue the only one of it's kind.

The festival brings hundreds of people to Roseberry each year to enjoy three enchanted evenings of grass-roots produced entertainment.

## So You Think this Winter has been Tough?

Reminiscing with Sandy Cottrell

I have heard many comments this winter regarding the amount of snow we've received and the number of stormy days that have occurred. One "old timer" was quoted as saying it was the worst winter he could remember with so much snow he had to have his roof shoveled, he had to dig out his house windows to keep them clear and the power was out for four hours one day. He related that if this kept up, he'd have to sell and move elsewhere. When asked how many Long Valley winters he'd experienced he proudly stated this was his fifth year in the valley.

Looking back I can personally recall many winters with more snow, more severe storms over more days, and certainly more power outages. And I don't even qualify as an old timer since I've only been here 45 years.

One particularly memorable event occurred in 1971. There were many storms that year with both rain and snow in December and January. On January 15, after almost 24 hours of snowing an inch an hour of a heavy wet snow, the McCall Donnelly High School gymnasium roof collapsed. I'll never forget walking around the ruins and seeing the patron names on the stadium seats, broken and scattered helter-skelter over the ground. Most winters the snow covered fence posts along the roads, and one year when I was keeping track, it snowed every day in March.

Power outages were fairly common every winter during the 1960's, 70's and into the 80's. There were many times my house was without power for 24 to 48 hours at a time. It was standard procedure to have gallon jugs of water, kerosene lamps, candles, flashlights and plenty of wood for the wood stove, set aside and ready for those inevitable outages. During those winters I was also glad to have an outhouse available.

Back in the 60's and 70's there seemed to be more severe dips in the temperature.

Temperatures of less than 20 degrees below zero occurred several times a winter at night and sometimes held into the days. Walking outside at minus 20 caused a distinct squeak of the boots and quick freeze of the nose hairs.

Another long time resident of Valley County

remembered winters when she was growing up; "there was always four to five feet of snow on the ground." The winter she thought was most memorable was "either '42 or '43. We lived just north of Donnelly and the wind blew so much that from the

house roof to the sauna it was just one big drift. We had to dig it out by hand and had a tunnel with snow so deep we could walk standing upright." She related they had to dig the tunnel to get to the sauna because the laundry as well as bathing was done there.


Probably the most cruel winter of all was 1888-89, after several open winters had enticed settlers to Long Valley. The great winter of '88 started in early November with a dump of eight feet of snow over several days. The problem was that settlers had not gotten winter supplies and cattle were still out on the range. Many cattle died of starvation and exposure and the settlers fared little better. By the end of the winter many families had eaten their seed potatoes, wheat seed and anything else they could find to keep from starving. When spring came they had nothing left to plant for crops and many left the valley.

So, is this a tough winter? If it snows every day in March, if the crocuses bloom under the snow, and if the daffodils and tulips bloom in July, I might have to agree; it was a tough winter.
