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Long Valley Preservation Society

A Thumbnail Sketch of The Railroad Coming to Long Valley

id you know that the last miles of railroad tracks were completed to McCall in 1914? Planning the route from Smith's Ferry to McCall was anxiously watched by the valley residents. The route the railroad took would determine the fate of several towns; those the railroad by-passed were doomed to fade away and die. The railroad decided to build three depots on their line, one at Cascade, another at Donnelly and the last one at the existing town of McCall. The railroad insisted the depot at the lake be named Lakeport, probably because of the freight hauling by steamboats on the lake. The local residents did not want their town's name changed, so after a few months the depot was renamed McCall.

After the new depots were built, Roseberry, one of the largest towns by-passed by the railroad, elected to move houses and businesses to the new town of Donnelly. Van Wyck, Crawford and Thunder City, all by-passed by the railroad, moved to the new town of Cascade.

The coming of the railroad to Long Valley gave the area an economic boost. Products could be shipped in and out of the valley

much cheaper and easier than hauling goods by freight wagons. For many years the trains from Nampa carried freight and passengers as far as McCall on the Oregon Short Line and later, The Union Pacific. Hundreds of people rode the train to McCall's first Winter Carnival held in 1923.
