Our Mission

To collect, care for, and interpret Valley County history at Roseberry Museum.

Preservation Accomplishments

Rebuilt the barn stage - with much help from the McCall Folklore Society.

Restored the porch on the Mahala House - with help from Frank Eld and other volunteers, a grant from the Finlandia Foundation, and a donation from the Barker family.

Rebuilt the porch on the Museum with help from volunteers and a donation from the Star News.

Painted the museum with help from a donations from Dave and Ann McQuade and the Star News.

Acquisition/Accessioning

The Long Valley Preservation Society traded Frank Eld the Arling House, a 1940s house restored and lived in by Frank Eld, for the Johnson House, an original Finnish homestead house also lovingly restored by Frank Eld. The Johnson House will be moved onto LVPS property during the coming summer.

Hundreds of artifacts were accessioned, safely stored, and hundreds more photographed and entered into our digital database.

Exhibits

Three new exhibits were built:

An 8-foot tall snow-ruler shows Valley County snowfall amounts through history.

An interactive childrens' exhibit focuses on early communication like typewriters and dialing telephones.

"Once Upon A Time - a photo exhibit of the early towns of Long Valley.

Education/Outreach

Museum volunteers developed the "Homesteading in Long Valley" game, perfect for middleschoolers, and played it with over 60 students. The game focuses on surviving the first very difficult year of homesteading in Valley County.

The McCall-Donnelly school 4th graders visited the museum for a day this autumn. The visit included a session of school in Roseberry's schoolhouse.

Talks on Roseberry and Valley County History were given by volunteers in Sweet and Boise.

150 hours planning


20 hours of education with school children
